## **Cat Vaccines**

No earlier than 4 months (if adult teeth are present)	As early as 12 weeks of age: then booster in 3-4 weeks
3-year rabies can be given with proof of previous rabies vaccine	Outdoor cats: Annually after first series  Indoor cats: Every 2 years  *FeLV/FIV testing required prior to vaccine as early as 8 weeks of age
FVRCP	
As early as 6 weeks: then 3-4 weeks apart until 16 weeks of age Cats w/ outdoor access over 16 weeks	
(without vaccine history): 2 doses 3-4 weeks apart*	
Cats w/ outdoor access over 16 weeks (with vaccine history): 1 dose*	
Indoor only cats over 16 weeks: 1 dose*	
**Any cat over 6 months: revaccinate every 3 years	

## What is FVRCP?

**Rhinotracheitis -** Respiratory infection triggered by the feline herpes virus.

**Calicivirus -** A common respiratory infection with an indication of ulcers in the mouth

**Panleukopenia (Feline Parvovirus) -** Highly contagious virus affecting blood cells in the intestinal tract, bone marrow, and brain. The virus is very hardy and can live months or years in the environment.

## What is FeLV?

Helps protect against Feline Leukemia. Feline Leukemia suppresses the immune system making cats more susceptible to infections and diseases. Can be transmitted through saliva and blood (grooming and fighting).
